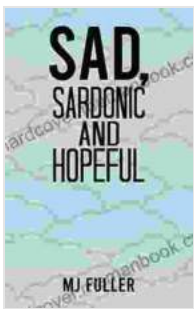


# Sad, Sardonic, and Hopeful: The Art of Irene Christodoulou

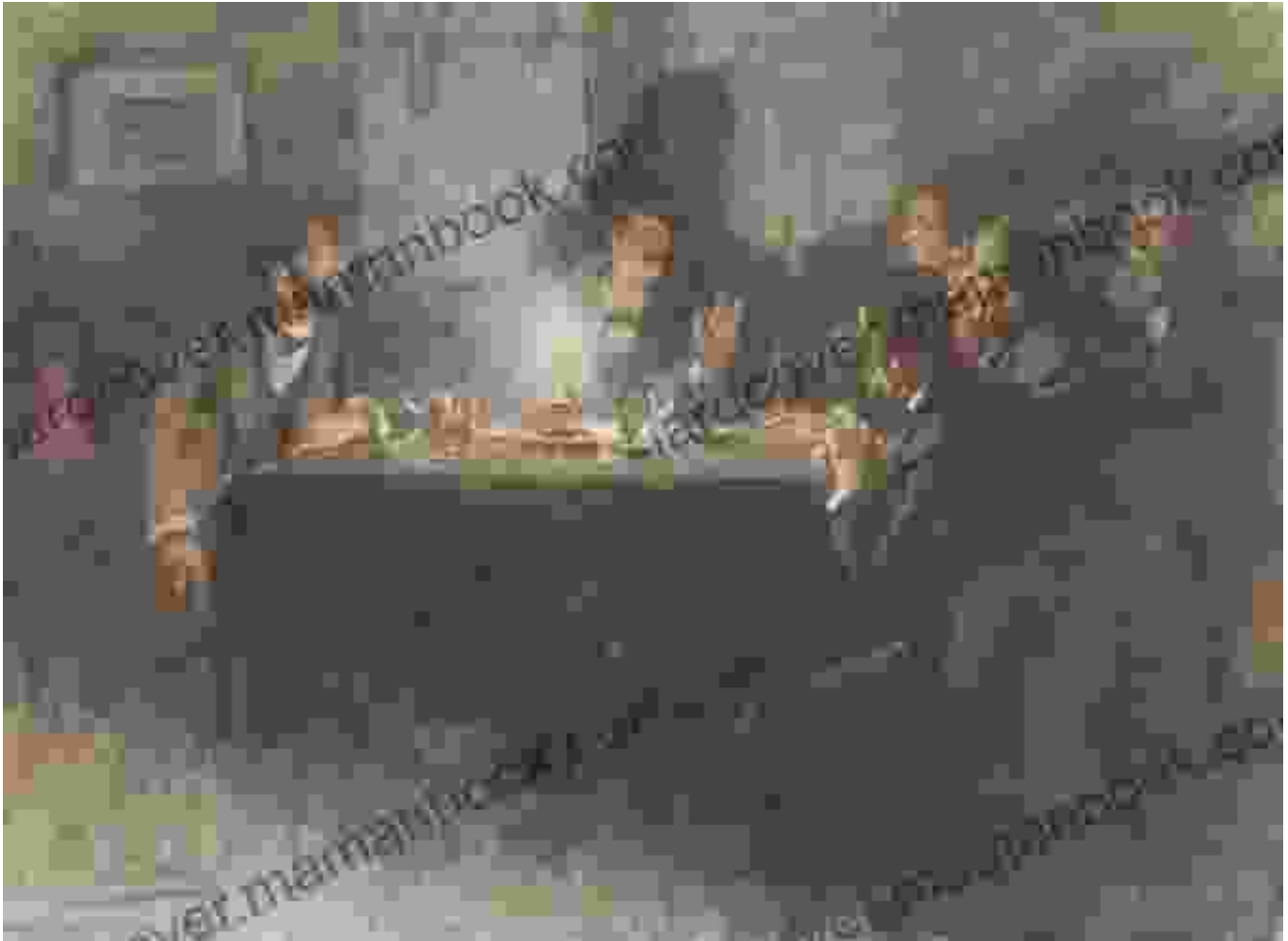

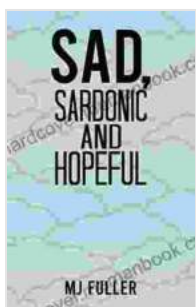
